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WHAT IS A "MENAGERIE"?

Menagerie, sound it out: "muh·**na**·zhr·ee." `A menagerie is a collection of animals, usually on display.

On a carrousel, **menagerie** animals are any animals that are not horses. The *Allan Herschell Company* created animals like lions, frogs and zebras like the one on the right from the Herschell Carrousel Factory Museum. The companies chose animals that people grew up with. Some other examples include: dogs, cats, and pigs. Companies also made animals that people at the time were only able to see in books





or at the zoo. These included: lions, tigers, and ostriches. The Allan Herschell Company made over twenty different **menagerie** animals. CARROUSEL STEM: MIXING RAINBOW

Begin by filling each clear cup half-way with water. Arrange the filled glasses to make a circle on a table. Remember, we need to let this sit overnight. So somewhere it won't be in the way. Pick one jar and add three drops of red food color, working in a circle. Skip the next glass. Add three drops of yellow food color to the glass. Skip the next glass. Add three drops of blue food color to the glass. This should leave every

DIFFICULTY: EASY

SET-UP TIME:

15MINUTES (LEAVE OVER NIGHT)

MATERIALS:

- 6 CLEAR GLASSES
- FOOD COLOR (RED, YELLOW, BLUE)
- 3 FULL SHEETS OF PAPER TOWEL
- WATER

other glass in the circle clear. You may need to move the colored glasses a bit to mix in the food coloring. Add a bit more water to the colored glasses so only the colored glasses are full. This will speed up our project later on.

Next, tear each paper towel in half. You should now have 6 pieces of paper towel. Take each piece individually and fold them in half three times. Take each piece of folded paper towel and bridge the clear glass to the red glass, the red glass to the clear glass to the yellow glass, the yellow glass to the clear glass, the clear glass to the blue glass, the blue glass to the clear - this glass should already have the paper towel you started with it's end in it. Allow the glasses to sit 3 hours for maximum mixing to occur. Check back about every 20 minutes to observe how the glasses are changing.

OBSERVATION QUESTIONS:

What are you seeing?

What happens when the paper towels get wet? What happens when you mix two colors, like red and blue?

Has the level of the water in the glasses changed?



THE SCIENCE:

Seeing the water "climb" up the pieces of paper towel is called **capillary action**. Capillary action is the ability for liquids, like water, to flow through narrow spaces without the effects of gravity working against it.

Now, we might not be able to see those narrow spaces in our paper towels, but those *really* narrow spaces are how are water is able to 'climb' from one glass to the next. Mixing our colors as they go, creating orange, green, and violet!

- write letters to a local nursing home




SNICKERDOODLE COOKIE RECIPE

- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- 1/2 cup butter, softened
- 2 eggs
- 2 3/4 cups flour
- 2 teaspoons cream of tartar
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 2 teaspoons ground cinnamon

Preheat oven to 350 degrees

Mix ingredients sugar through salt in a medium mixing bowl by hand. Once thoroughly combined, roll into 1 inch balls and set aside. In a small dish combine the remaining 2 tablespoons sugar with 2 teaspoons cinnamon. Roll each ball in cinnamon sugar mixture until covered. Bake on a greased cookie sheet 2 inches apart 8 - 10 mins.

Makes about 5 dozen cookies.


Want to participate in our craft after? You will need:
